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# Introduction- About the College Campaign

The Maryland College Application Campaign (MCAC) is a statewide effort to increase post-secondary access through the dissemination of ideas, development of practices, and technical assistance for implementation of the college application campaign. The purpose of the MCAC is to help seniors and families navigate the post-secondary admissions process and to ensure each participating senior submits at least **one** admission application.

The MCAC is a partnership with the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE), the Maryland Higher Education Commission (MHEC), and College Goal Maryland (CGMD). Since 2014, the MCAC has supported high school seniors across the state. In 2018, **166** high schools across the state provided support approximately 31,000 seniors that submitted over **83,000** post-secondary education applications during the MCAC in October. In addition, seniors and families received support with the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) process. The program is part of the American College Application Campaign (ACAC) sponsored by the ACT Center for Equity in Learning. The MHEC provided funding to initiate the MCAC through the Federal College Access Challenge Grant.

**In 2019, the MCAC will be held for one month, September 30<sup>th</sup> – October 31<sup>st</sup>. Each schools should select one week for their MCAC event during the month. The school site coordinator should inform the State Coordinator of the dates of their MCAC event.**

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# Section 1

## Responsibilities of Participating High Schools

Participating high schools should include the following efforts in their College Application Week initiatives:

- Host a program during the school day that is open to any student interested in applying to a post-secondary education option with a focus on engaging:
  - low-income students;
  - first-generation students;
  - students enrolled as homeless
  - students enrolled as foster care students;
  - special education students;
  - students in the juvenile education system; and
  - students who may otherwise not apply to college or post-secondary options.
- Identify and create a school team comprised of staff and community members. To structure your school team, focus on the following:
  - building a school-wide MCAC planning team to encourage teachers, counselors, administrators, and community partners to get involved;
  - establish your planning team during the spring before your MCAC event is scheduled to occur;
  - meet regularly with the planning team to select activities appropriate to your students and school environment;
  - touch base on progress with tasks and assignments, as well as determine the best dates and times for scheduling activities; and
  - remember to include activities for juniors to prepare them for their post-secondary plans.
- Contact community stakeholder to serve on your planning team. There are many ways to involve these stakeholders. Listed below are potential community stakeholders. Keep in mind the list is not exhaustive, and any other community stakeholder may be engaged who have vested interest in post-secondary education access and success. Potential stakeholders may include:
  - admission representatives from local colleges and universities (two-year and four-year);
  - local GEAR UP Coordinators;
  - faith-based community;
  - PTA and other parent/family members who want to be engaged in the process;
  - Student leaders at your school;

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- Local business leaders;
- Local school board members; and
- Non-profit organization community.

### Implementing a College Application Campaign Program: Overview

Each high school must identify a site coordinator, typically a high school counselor or assistant principal, who will be responsible for implementing the program. Tools and resources provided by the MCAC may be used or customized to your school's program.

- Add activities to the school's calendar and morning announcements.
- Reserve space for activities, including computer lab space for submitting applications, completing online college research, and FAFSA completion events.
- Fold MCAC activities into your school-wide career development process.
- Create a college-going culture by involving 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grade students in MCAC activities.
- For the homeless and foster care student population, consider including your school's homeless education liaison and foster care liaison, as well as others who support specific student populations – e.g., ESOL or Special Education leadership on your team.
- Follow up with students after the event to ensure applications submitted are complete (transcripts, college entrance exam scores, letters of recommendation, submitting a complete FAFSA, etc.).
- Develop a list of community members and/or school partners who can assist with recruiting volunteers or donating supplies for your events.
- Ensure students complete the MCAC Student Survey to collect data requested by the State Coordinator including, but not limited to, the number of students participating and the number of applications submitted. If your school is using s

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**Planning and Communicating the Campaign Program**

It is important that your school communicate the campaign opportunities to students, their families and your local community. Suggestions for communicating and marketing your MCAC events are available in this guidebook and on MCAC’s website at [www.marylandpublicschools.org/mdcac](http://www.marylandpublicschools.org/mdcac) under **Most Requested Resources**.

Although College Application Week initiatives are implemented in the fall, planning for the program can begin earlier in the calendar year. It is recommended to begin working with high school juniors in the spring on college-going culture activities, and obtaining their Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID. A timeline to guide the planning of your school’s event is provided in this manual.

**School Team: Agenda Items for your Convening**

The school team should convene to plan the college application campaign. The school team may comprise of a variety of stakeholders who will be extremely effective in supporting your campaign event. For planning purposes, the suggested outlined agenda below may be used to structure your MCAC campaign. There are a variety of topics that may be, and should be considered for discussion with your school team.

**Some of the key topics the school team should discuss are:**

- Purpose of the College Application Campaign event;
- Role of each school team member;
- Date(s) for the MCAC event is **September 30<sup>th</sup> – October 31<sup>th</sup>, 2019;**
- Communication strategy: student, parents, school staff, community;
- Pre-Application events – ensuring students are prepared;
- Pre-Application events – creating or enhancing a college-going culture;
- Recruiting students for the initiative;
- Engaging volunteers;
- Evaluation and data collection; and
- Application follow-up – ensuring the college and financial aid processes are completed.

After your MCAC event, your school team should meet to debrief on the successes and challenges of the event. The debrief meeting should occur as close to the conclusion of your school’s college application event. By quickly assessing what worked and what areas need improvement, your school team can get a jump-start on planning for the following year’s program.

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**Involve Staff**

Ask teachers to dedicate time to an in-class assignment related to students’ post-secondary planning:

- Ask mathematics or personal finance teachers to do a lesson on calculating financial need and student loan repayment options;
- Ask government and economics teachers to lead a “college match” lesson where students research and identify schools that are a good fit academically, financially, and educationally;
- Ask technology teachers to conduct virtual college tours with students;
- Work with media/journalism teachers to create ads or promotional videos for local media outlets including radio, television and newspaper; and
- Have English teachers assign a project to write admissions essays. You can find essay starter questions on college websites.

**Involve Students**

It is important to involve students from other grades to help establish a college-going culture within the school. Students and classes can help promote events. For example, work with underclass advisors to get student volunteers to help decorate for an event or involve the school pep band to lead school-wide pep rallies for the Kick-Off and Decision Day events.

**Involve Parents**

**October is National Family Engagement month.** Ask to put the MCAC on the agenda at a Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) and/or Parent Teacher Association (PTA) meeting in September or set up a table during parent/teacher conferences, which are typically held in October. Ask parents to volunteer or donate supplies for MCAC events and, of course, answer questions parents may have about preparing, applying, and paying for college. For the homeless and foster care student population, encourage students to get trusted adults involved (friends, relatives, service providers) in the college planning process.

**Involve the Community**

Volunteers can be a critical component of your College Application Campaign event. Inviting community members that have a vested interest in college access and success to be on your planning team will provide you with support for the various logistics necessary to implement a successful College Application Campaign. When planning and implementing your school’s MCAC initiative, you should follow all district and school policies regarding non-school personnel visiting, volunteering, or otherwise assisting with your school’s program. For

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the homeless and foster care student population, consider reaching out to outside programs that provide services/supports— e.g. local Departments of Social Services, homeless youth drop in centers, afterschool programs, and mentoring programs.

### **Involve Higher Education**

Institutions of Higher Education (IHE) often have resources, speakers and materials available to help prepare students and parents for their next steps into post-secondary education. Make sure you consider strategies like setting up campus tours for both students and parents, especially for those students who may be the first to go to college in their family. Be especially cognizant that this may be the first time some participants will be on a college campus.

### **Marquee**

Use your school’s marquee to inform and remind students, families, staff, and the community about your upcoming College Application event. Post this information about two weeks prior to your MCAC event.

### **College Wall of Fame**

Use a bulletin board in the school to celebrate the applications submitted by your seniors. Have students write their name and the names of the colleges they applied to on construction paper and post it to the college wall. Students who apply prior to your College Application event can participate and get the wall started. Students who apply during your event can join the fun and add their notes after they submit their applications.

### **Friday Night Lights**

Have an information table set up at your high school’s football games to make students and families aware of your school’s upcoming event. Have an information sheet available to hand out and a sign-up sheet for any parents or community members who would like to volunteer at your program.

### **Engaging Underclassmen in the MCAC Program**

The earlier students begin thinking about college, the better. Many schools have started engaging underclassmen in their College Application Campaign event activities to create awareness and excitement for the school’s event. This is a great way to ensure students are prepared when it’s their time to apply to college.

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Here are some information sessions and activities you may implement with your underclassmen prior to, or during your College Application event:

- 9th grade: Decision making, learning styles, study habits, high school transcript and academic planning, connection between school and careers, how to qualify for a scholarship, colleges and the degrees offered, and college admission criteria
- 10<sup>th</sup> grade: Progress check, extracurricular world of work, college cost and ways to pay activities, earning college credit during high school, college visits (online) PSAT, etc.
- 11th grade: Money management, finding scholarships, admission process, college entrance tests, preparing to apply, writing personal statements and essays, etc.

Also, use the grade-level checklists available on the U.S. Department of Education’s Federal Student Aid Office website to ensure students understand the steps they need to take to become academically and financially prepared for college: <http://studentaid.ed.gov/prepare-for-college/checklists>.

### Develop Your Schedule of Activities

#### Kick-off Assembly or Celebration

The general idea for the kick-off event is to build excitement about MCAC events and students’ post-secondary education options. You may want to solicit an outside speaker, explain the MCAC activities and procedures, distribute MCAC student materials, and/or offer door prize(s) for attendance. Be sure to present that the campaign links both the **college application process and the FAFSA completion process**.

#### Maryland College Application Campaign (MCAC) Month

The goal of this month is to have every senior student apply to at least **one** post-secondary institution (two-year, four-year, private career school, and/or apprenticeship). Students who have plans to enter the military or students who have no plans to attend college should participate so that they can be exposed to the process. See the Appendices for more information about each postsecondary options.

After applying for postsecondary admissions, one of the next steps in the college preparation process is submitting financial aid forms. **The FAFSA is available on October 1<sup>st</sup>**. This is a perfect time to help students learn about and get ready for completing the FAFSA. It is a great time to educate parents about the FAFSA process.

The October 1<sup>st</sup> date may allow students to receive an early estimate of financial aid so they may explore additional option for tuition funding. **As part of the MCAC week application process, make certain students obtain their Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID if they have not completed this procedure** (Refer to page 24 of this guidebook for FSA ID Instructions. Instruction are also located on the MCAC website).

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### College Fairs

Look for college fairs to be offered during the months of September and October. If your school is hosting or attending a college fair, you may want to schedule your MCAC activities during the same month or other time frame when the fair is scheduled. This can be a great way for MCAC participants to direct questions to specific colleges as well as build enthusiasm over college attendance.

### Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) Event

Each school site participating in the MCAC must host or participate in a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) Completion Event. Confirm the dates for your FAFSA Completion Event in the spring prior to your the MCAC Application Week in the fall. Participating schools are required to register for their FAFSA Completion Event at [www.collegegoalmaryland.org](http://www.collegegoalmaryland.org). Once on the site, to register, click on the **REGISTRATION** button and follow the prompts.

You may work with a community partner such as the local community college to assist in planning your FAFSA Completion Events and informational sessions for parents on paying for college. ### Assisting Parents with FAFSA Completion

For your FAFSA completion event, you may want to reserve enough computers and lab time for parents to use to complete the FAFSA. This time can be used to provide parents an overview of the FAFSA process. If using the data retrieval tool is not an option while parents are completing the FAFSA, you may ask parents to bring their tax information to assist in the application process. FAFSA events may be held in the evening, during the day or on a Saturday, if staff are available. **A suggestion:** schools may collaborate to hold FAFSA completion events, and/or requests financial aid specialists from a local college or university to attend to provide assistance. ### Communicating with parents to attend FAFSA completion events

- Send text or email blasts to parents at the beginning of the school year informing them of your upcoming FAFSA event.
- Include the date and time of the event in your schools' morning announcement.
- Showcase your upcoming FAFSA event on your school marquee sign.
- Post upcoming FAFSA events in the school's office.



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### Parent and Volunteer Information Letters

To help get the word out, sample letters are included in this guidebook that can be sent to parents and community partners about your school's College Application event. These should be sent about one-month prior to your College Application Campaign event on school letterhead.

### College Experiences Bingo

Encourage students to play this game (*card template included in this guidebook*) to promote discussion of college life.

### Student Reminder Form

Remind students about your school's College Application Campaign Event (See Section 8 for template). School counselors may also use the reminder to confirm college-planning appointments with students.

### Understanding Your Award Letter Events

There is no standard format for students' award letters. However, they should contain the same overall information such as:

- How much your year in college will cost?
- How much the school financial aid package is giving you?
- What portion will the family contribute?
- How much of a gap is there to make up through other sources?

You may contact College Goal Maryland to assist with planning these events.

### College Decision Day Event

The goal of **College Decision Day** is to recognize high school seniors for their postsecondary education plans, and to encourage younger students and families to prepare early for postsecondary education. College Decision Day is generally held on or around May 1 and is designed to coincide with the date that most seniors must inform a postsecondary of their plan to enroll. Make this event fun and festive! College Decision Day is inspired by the NCAA's National Signing Day to reinforce that excellence in the classroom should be given as much pomp and circumstance as excellence as an athlete. NCAA's National Signing Day is a celebration where high school seniors sign a letter of intent to play sports at a specific college.

### One-On-One Assistance to Students Completing and Submitting Admissions Applications

For this activity it is important to reserve enough computers and lab time so that each high school senior can submit at least one admission application during your MCAC activities. An average student typically requires about an hour to successfully complete and submit one college application. Even if the student is planning to enter the military or workforce, it is beneficial to have them complete at least one admissions application. To be considered for State funding, the student **must** complete one application to at least one Maryland institution.

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Having every student complete an admissions application gives them the experience for the future. Prior to participating in this activity, the student should have completed the College Application and College Fit Worksheet. Students should also save confirmation printouts from their submitted applications in their College Portfolios.

### **One-On-One Counseling with Students about College Fit and Calculation of Total Costs and Net Price**

Effective college guidance for low-income students involves a host of tasks and takes time and includes helping students identify college matches that offer robust support structures and adequate funding. You may wish to use the **College Fit Worksheet** (see Section 8) to assist guide the discussion, and to help students document and remember their needs and concerns about attending college/training program.

### **College Preparation Workshops**

To help with the college preparation, it may be helpful to schedule workshops for students and parents/guardians, and invite college students to participate on a panel to address college-life questions. For many students, especially first-generation college students the thought of living away from home can be particularly stressful. Include workshops on financing college as well.

### **One-On-One Assistance to Students Applying for ACT or SAT Exam Fee Waivers and Registering for a Test Date**

To be eligible for an ACT fee waiver, a student must be enrolled in the 11th or 12th grade, either a U.S. citizen or testing in the U.S., U.S. territories, or Puerto Rico and meet one or more indicators of economic need listed on the fee waiver form. Eligible students may receive a maximum of two separate fee waivers in total. A waiver is used at the time the student registers for an exam and may not be used to cover late registration fees, test date changes, test location changes, or other fees or services. Copies of test registration confirmation pages should be stored in the College Portfolio to help keep the student organized. The ACT website can be found at <http://www.actstudent.org>.

### **Workshops with Military Representatives to Discuss ROTC Opportunities or Veterans' Education Benefits**

The branches of the U.S. military offer education payment and training benefits for service members. For more information, visit [www.benefits.va.gov/gibill/education\\_programs.asp](http://www.benefits.va.gov/gibill/education_programs.asp).

### **Individual Student Profiles or Videos to Gather Student Feedback and Quotes**

This type of activity should be fun for students and may be useful to promote your next year's MCAC activities. You may want to consider using Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Snapchat, YouTube, Blogging or other social media platforms to help reach as many students as possible to build excitement for a college-going culture. For the homeless and foster care student population, consider soliciting quotes/video clips from students representing special population groups who successfully applied for or enrolled in college.

### **End of the MCAC Week “I Applied” Celebration**

You may wish to celebrate with a school assembly or some other type of event to acknowledge everyone’s hard work. This is a perfect time to share the list of all postsecondary options to which students applied during your MCAC event.

### **EXPLORING POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION OPTIONS**

It is important for students to explore post-secondary options after high school. There are many options to continue education after high school. Here are a few examples of postsecondary education options:

- Two-year college
- Four-year college or university
- Apprenticeship
- Trade school
- Career or technical education programs
- Military
- Job Corp
- Professional Training Corp

Pursuing a postsecondary may include a career training program. Below are examples of ways students may enter their postsecondary pathway.

#### **Apprenticeship**

Apprenticeship Maryland is a Career and Technology Education (CTE) program designed to prepare students for sustainable employment and further education based on career pathways in Manufacturing and Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) related fields as well as traditional occupations. Participating students start the program in their junior year and complete at least one year of related classroom instruction and a minimum of 450 hours of work-based training under the supervision of an eligible employer. #### **Year Up Baltimore**

Year Up Baltimore is a Professional Training Corps (PTC) in Baltimore that was launched in 2010 on the campus of Baltimore City Community College (BCCC). Year Up’s PTC offers an intensive, one-year program for college students, ages 18-24, combining professional coaching, hands-on skill development, and internships at some of America’s top companies. . The postsecondary program combines hands-on skills development, courses eligible for college credit, and corporate internships to prepare students for success in professional careers and higher education.

Students develop skills through the alignment of training with corporate partner needs and market trends to ensure that skills learned will be in-demand. They also learn valuable technical and professional skills, and gain work experience during internships at top companies. As college students, young adults have access to the library, tutoring resources, and other services offered by the college, in addition to the services offered by Year Up. As students work toward completing a degree at BCCC, Year Up PTC provides them with

professional development and work experience, preparing graduates to launch a meaningful career. 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## Section 2

### Promoting Your Maryland College Application Campaign Activities

#### SECTION CHECKLIST

- ✓ Use the statewide MCAC logo on your promotional materials.
- ✓ Have students create a MCAC banner and hang it in a visible, well-trafficked area such as the cafeteria, gym, or entrance area. Be sure to include FAFSA Completion and Decision Day on Banner.
- ✓ Post a schedule of your program’s activities
- ✓ Verify that all MCAC planned activities are listed on the school calendar.
- ✓ Promote the MCAC by using the media classes to create ads for local radio, television and newspapers.
- ✓ Schedule phone blast and/or text message reminders.
- ✓ Request that the MCAC be added to school announcements and social media posts.
- ✓ Use the hash tag **#MDcollegestrong** on social media post. Tag the MCAC.
- ✓ When the MCAC is near, add it to your school’s outdoor signage.
- ✓ Develop and post a schedule of your MCAC activities. A sample may be found in the Resource Section of this guidebook (see Section 8).

#### Promotional Materials

Make sure you have all of your promotional items and materials ready at least two weeks prior to your MCAC kick-off event. To keep the cost of promotion to a minimum, ask for help from the Graphic Arts teachers or obtain donations from community members.

#### Suggested Items:

**MCAC Buttons** — Distribute to teachers, staff, and volunteers to wear to help promote events and identify volunteers.

**MCAC “I Applied” Stickers** — Distribute to each senior who submits a postsecondary application. **See Section 8 for stickers that may be printed to give to students after they complete their college applications.**

**Ask Me! Stickers and Signage** — Distribute to teachers, administrators, and volunteers to encourage conversations about their college selection and application experiences (see Section 8 for Ask Me! door signage)

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### **“Ask Me!” About It Signs**

This is a quick and low-cost way to create awareness and excitement for your school’s MCAC event. Create an electronic “8 1/2 x 11” “Ask Me!” sign and send it to all staff members in the school – ask them to customize it to their alma mater and display it outside their classroom or office. See Section 8 for a suggested MCAC door signage.

### **Ask Me About My College! Signs and Stickers**

Ask Me About My College! stickers and signs invite inquiries and discussion about colleges, majors and other subjects emphasizing a high school’s college going culture in the days and weeks leading up to your College Application Campaign event.

- Ask Me About My College! stickers can be worn by teachers, administrators, and school implementation team members
- Ask Me About My College! signs can be displayed in teachers’ classrooms, in administrator offices, in the library and throughout the entire building.

### **Door Decorating Contest**

Prior to your kick-off event for the MCAC, ask all staff to decorate their classroom or office doors with drawings, pictures, or artifacts from their alma mater. Urge students to ask staff about their college experiences. Hold a contest for the best door decoration. Ask the student body to vote for the top three doors. Give a certificate award to the winners at your Kick-Off event.

### **College T-Shirt Days**

Designate special days during your MCAC events for teachers and staff to wear shirts from their college alma maters. This helps heighten excitement about college and the vast options of postsecondary schools and programs.

### **Information Letters**

Public awareness letters may be sent to parents and community partners about your school’s MCAC efforts and about informational sessions for parents and students. These should be sent about at least one week prior to your MCAC event on school letterhead.

### **Phone Blasts/Text Blast/Email Blast**

Use phone and/or text blast to remind parents that the MCAC opportunity is available to their child and support will be available to complete the FAFSA. It is recommended that this is implemented at least three weeks prior to the MCAC week. See Section 8 for a sample Phone/Email Blast Message.

### **Mayoral Proclamation**

The MCAC State Coordinator asks for a gubernatorial proclamation for the state’s initiative. A mayoral proclamation for your school’s event is a wonderful complement. If there are multiple schools in your area implementing an event, be sure to coordinate with them so the proclamation is accurate and reflects all participating schools (see Section 8).

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### Working with Local Media

You may want to highlight your MCAC activities by contacting your local media. If school policy allows, invite them to be a part of your program. Media coverage will help students, families, and the community, recognize the importance of this program for your school and students.

### Post Event Press Release

To keep your MCAC efforts in the news, send out a post event press release after each of your MCAC events. Include data about your accomplishments and give a shout-out to your community Partners (see Section 8).

### Website and Social Media Presence

Designate a member of your planning committee to work with your administrator to post information, pictures, and videos to your school’s website. Use the hash tag **#MDcollegestrong** to tag the MCAC social media sites. Be sure to use social media before, during, and after your MCAC events and FAFSA events.

### Promoting MCAC – Involve Community Partners

The MCAC aims to create a college going culture for students and families. To help generate excitement and engagement among seniors participating in the MCAC, site coordinators may use the sample donation letter in Section 8 to partner with community businesses for donations. Donations may be in the form of monetary, time and/or resources. A suggested process may be to create a raffle for students who complete the sample criteria listed below to enter in a MCAC raffle. The raffle prizes may be used towards prom services. For example, send the donation letter to a community barber shop for male students to raffle for a free haircut, or to a community hair salon for female students to hair service for prom or a community limousine service or a florist. If monetary donations are received, perhaps prom tickets may be purchased for a raffle prize. Any creative idea may be used to promote excitement for students and families.

### Suggested Raffle Requirements

- Complete at least three applications (two-year, four-year college/universities, and/ or private career school), one college application **must** be a Maryland institution
- Parent/Guardian attends the FAFSA completion event
- Complete the College Fit Worksheet **or** College Worksheet
- Complete a college essay

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### Social Media

A great way to keep students, staff, the community, parents and the general public informed about the **Maryland College Application Campaign** is through the use of social media. The MCAC launched a Facebook, Twitter and Instagram sites to allow schools to promote the MCAC, to provide information about FAFSA, and other college preparation materials. It is also a way for schools to upload pictures and videos promoting their MCAC events and activities. Social Media platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, Snap Chat, Instagram, and YouTube provide opportunities to show case the MCAC process and students proudly participating in the campaign, applying for college. When posting on social media, please encourage your schools, students, staff, and parents to use the hash tag: **#MDCollegeStrong**

# Section 3

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## Helping Students Prepare for Maryland College Application Campaign Week

### SECTION CHECKLIST

- Distribute event preparation materials to students:
  - College Application Worksheet
  - College Fit Worksheet
  - College Portfolio
  - Student Data Form
  - College Application Worksheet
- Encourage students to complete college research prior to the MCAC Application Week.
- Give teachers goals and objectives for integrated lessons.
- Register students and families for FAFSA Completion Events.
- Communicate with parents about the MCAC and FAFSA events and solicit their help as volunteers.

### School Choice and Counseling Students about College Fit

Ideally students should arrive at the computer lab during the application activity with a list of colleges they are interested in attending. The **College Fit Worksheet and College Application Worksheet (see Section 8)** are ideal tools for students to research and record information about the schools in which they may be interested.

#### Location

In state or out of state; proximity to home and travel expenses necessary to visit home. What about in-state vs. out-of-state tuition costs?

#### Type: Public or Private

Among independent post-secondary institutions are four-year colleges and universities; two-year colleges; and private career schools approved by the Maryland Higher Education Commission. For more information on which programs are accredited, see: [www.mhec.maryland.md.us/highered/heprograms.asp](http://www.mhec.maryland.md.us/highered/heprograms.asp)

#### Size

Would the student be interested in the experience of a large university? Or would the student benefit from a smaller school where it might be easier to develop connections with teachers and school staff? Information about a school's enrollment as well as its student-to-faculty ratio should be available on its website. Use a website such as <https://bigfuture.collegeboard.org/compare-colleges> to compare colleges to find the best fit.

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### Available majors/programs and admissions selectivity

Is the student interested in obtaining an associate or bachelor's degree? For students who want to obtain a bachelor's degree, a community college may still be the place to begin. Consideration should be made according to transferability of credits and courses as well as cost. Transferability of credits can be researched using the Maryland Higher Education Commission's (MHEC) transfer guide at <http://www.mhec.maryland.md.us/preparing/stuguide.asp>.

Several resources are provided by MHEC to help students understand the things they need to do to prepare for college, research colleges, and learn how to pay for college. For a grade-by-grade planning guide to prepare for college go to [www.mdgo4it.mhec.maryland.gov/ready-for-college/grade.html](http://www.mdgo4it.mhec.maryland.gov/ready-for-college/grade.html).

### Total Cost, Net Price and Other Data

Net price is the difference between the "sticker" price (full cost) to attend college, minus any grants and scholarships. By federal law, each institution is required to provide a version of the Net Price Calculator on its website. To find out what the "net price" is for a specific college or university, check out [www.collegecost.ed.gov/netpricecenter.aspx](http://www.collegecost.ed.gov/netpricecenter.aspx). Colleges will also typically provide information such as their first-to-second year retention rates, the numbers and percentages of students enrolled by various demographic categories, graduation rates, average student loan debt of its graduates, and more.

### The U.S. Department of Education's College Affordability and Transparency Center

This provides a College Scorecard to help students and families better understand the affordability and outcomes associated with particular postsecondary schools. For more information, visit [www.collegecost.ed.gov](http://www.collegecost.ed.gov)

### Admission Fees

Most colleges require application fees when a student submits an application to their school. Many colleges will require a credit card, pre-paid credit card, debit card or electronic check information in order to submit an application online. Students who are unable to provide payment information during MCAC week can save an application and submit it later. Or ask the school counselor for an application for a fee waiver.

### College Application Fee Waivers

Applying for college can be expensive for any student. Some colleges and postsecondary institutions do not charge admissions fees. Application fees may prohibit some families, especially those with a financial burden or hardship, from applying to college. It is important to let students and parents know that they may be eligible for waivers of these fees. The **College Application Worksheet** includes spaces to record the appropriate information for fees and waivers.

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### **Federal Money for College**

When it comes to paying for college, there are grants, scholarships, work-study and low interest grants available. For more information regarding various federal aid programs visit the Student Aid website at [www.studentaid.gov](http://www.studentaid.gov). For tip on where to find links for a free online scholarship, visit [www.studentsid.gov/scholarhsip](http://www.studentsid.gov/scholarhsip).

There are three types of fee waivers typically accepted by colleges and universities, but it is important to note that not all colleges and universities will accept fee waivers. For further information about fee waivers, students should speak directly with their high school counselor to determine which colleges will accept fee waivers.

### **National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC)**

The NACAC Request for Admission Application Fee Waiver Form is for traditional high school students who meet NACAC's requirements. This form should be used for the school the student is the most interested in attending (up to four schools). Not all schools will accept the NACAC fee waiver form. Download the fee waiver form at [www.nacacfairs.org](http://www.nacacfairs.org). The form needs to be reviewed and approved by individual institutions. **See Section 8 for a copy of the NACAC Request for Admission Application Fee Waiver Form.**

### **College Application Worksheet**

To assist students with completing their college application. Teachers may work with students to complete the College Application Worksheet. See the next page for the college application worksheet.

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### ACT Fee Waiver

Many colleges and universities will consider waiving or deferring the admission application fee for students who have been granted an **ACT Fee Waiver**. To facilitate consideration of such requests, ACT has provided a request form in the 2019–2020 ACT User Handbook for Educators for high school counselors to photocopy and complete for students. Individual institutions are not obligated to waive or defer their admission application fees for any specific applicants. **See Section 8 for the Request for Waiver or Deferral of College Admission Application Fee Form.** The ACT User Handbook for Educators may be located at <http://www.act.org/content/dam/act/unsecured/documents/ACT-UserHandbook.pdf>

### College Board

The College Board fee waivers cover more than just the testing fees. Students who are eligible for fee waivers can also receive up to four Requests for Waiver of College Application Fee forms free or at a reduced price.

### Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

Many students and parents may not be aware of the FAFSA or they may feel anxious about filling it out. Make sure they know that they will need a FSA ID before they can begin filling out the form online so they are prepared to complete the form.

In order to guide them through the application, you might wish to arrange for them to attend a FAFSA completion event at which they can get help as they complete the form. You may either host the event at your school or find one in the community for them to attend. Remember to schedule the computer lab for your FAFSA completion events so that parents and students can work on the application online!

Generally, the way FAFSA completion events function is that students and parents attend with their financial documents in hand, sit down at computers, and fill out the FAFSA with volunteer assistance. The host organization might also have a speaker guide the entire group by reviewing the FAFSA question by question, or have students and parents go through the application at their own pace as experts stand by to answer individual questions.

### FSA ID

Students (and parents) will log on to FAFSA on the Web at <https://www.fafsa.ed.gov> with a username and password that they create. This removes the need for the personal identification number (PIN) and the use of personal identifiers such as name, birth date, and Social Security number. Users do not need to do anything to prepare for it; when they first log on, they will be asked to create a username and password. If they already have a PIN, they will have the option to link it to their new FSA ID, which will allow them to immediately use the FSA ID rather than wait 1–3 days while their identifying information is confirmed.



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### **Maryland College Aid Processing System (MDCAPS)**

MDCAPS is MHEC's comprehensive financial aid system that allows us to process State scholarship applications and allocate funds more efficiently using today's technology. To use MDCAPS, you must first create a student login profile. The profile creation process will request an email address. An activation link will be sent to the email address provided.

If the student does not have an MDCAPS account he/she can create an account at any time. After the username and password have been created, the student will be sent an email with an activation link to start working in their MDCAPS account. To get started with a profile, click the MDCAPS logo or use this link, <https://mdcaps.mhec.state.md.us>. Next, click "Create a Student Login" located below the yellow [Login] button. If you are having trouble creating an MDCAPS profile and logging in, visit [www.mhec.maryland.gov](http://www.mhec.maryland.gov).

### **United States Department of Education School Code Lists**

Federal school codes may be found in the online FAFSA or at <http://ifap.ed.gov/ifap/fedSchoolCodeList.jsp>. School codes are issued by the U.S. Department of Education at the time the school is approved to participate in any of the federal financial aid programs, such as the Pell Grant or student loans. The school code is useful at the time of applying for college admissions and is required when the student submits the FAFSA after October 1st.

### **Communicating with Parents**

To make sure your students are fully prepared to submit admission the FAFSA during your MCAC activities, it is important to communicate with parents of seniors. In some cases, students may need to obtain a parent's financial information to take care of any required admissions fees. It is important that parents are aware of the activities you are planning and their needed support and encouragement.

Parents may be helpful to students in reviewing potential colleges and determining what schools are a good fit for individual circumstances and preferences. For some activities, it may be appropriate to invite parents to participate along with their student as they complete their college applications.

### **ACT Profiles**

ACT Profile is a first-of-its-kind college and career planning community, built on 30+ years of ACT research. Mobile, social, and free to the public, ACT Profile delivers powerful, personalized insights to inform individuals as they navigate through life's key decision points. 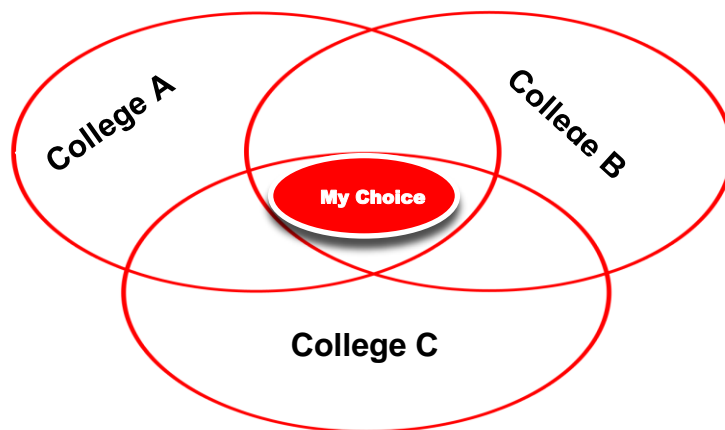

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## Section 4

### Student Populations

MCAC is open to **all** student groups underrepresented in higher education. Although the college campaign primary focus is first-generation students and students from low income circumstances, each year the intent of the MCAC is to ensure other student populations are equally provided the opportunity to take the first step towards their post-secondary career. In addition to low-income and first-generation students, schools are encouraged to focus on students with disabilities, and students enrolled in charter schools and alternative programs. In 2017, the MCAC added a focus on homeless students, students in and transitioning from foster care, and students in the juvenile education program. Each public school system in Maryland has a Homeless Education Liaison and a Foster Care Liaison; the MCAC recommends collaborating to support students who are homeless and in foster care. See Section 8 for a listing of each school system homeless liaison and foster care liaison.

Students in juvenile education services are also included in the MCAC. The MCAC partners collaborated with the juvenile education system coordinator at the MSDE to include this student population. If you have any questions about this population, contact the MCAC State Coordinator.

In many cases, homeless students and foster care students may be able to receive a tuition waiver to attend a two or four-year college or university in Maryland. They may also be able to complete their own FAFSA. Please verify each student's requirements with the homeless liaison or the foster care liaison.

### Tuition Waiver for Unaccompanied Homeless Youth

Students pursuing bachelor's degrees, associate's degrees, or vocational certificates at public higher education institutions in Maryland qualify for the Unaccompanied Homeless Youth Tuition Waiver – a full waiver of all tuition and school fees each year, for up to five years – if they:

- Are homeless, including:
  - doubled up or couch surfing;
  - staying in shelters;
  - staying in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, motels/hotels because of a lack of alternatives, or on the street
  - (students who live on campus during the school year but are homeless during breaks are considered homeless for purposes of the waiver); and
- Are not receiving financial or significant in-kind support from a parent or legal guardian; and
- Have lived in Maryland for at least one year (students must be permitted to demonstrate residency through non-traditional means, such as a statement from a service provider, or friend who is hosting the student); and
- Have a high school diploma or GED; and
- Complete and file the FAFSA; and
- Enroll in school on or before their 25th birthday

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To establish eligibility for the waiver each year, a student must verify his or her status as unaccompanied homeless youth by:

- Obtaining a verification letter from his/her public school homeless education liaison (for students who were in public high school the year prior to enrolling in a higher education program), or
- Obtaining a verification letter from a publicly-funded shelter where the youth is receiving services, or
- Contacting the financial aid office at his/her higher education institution to ask that the office make an independent determination of the student’s status as an unaccompanied homeless youth. The institution should interview the student to make its determination and cannot require that the student submit supporting documentation, although the student may choose to present such documentation (e.g. a letter from a friend or service provider who knows his/her circumstances) if he or she wishes.

#### **Tuition Waiver for Foster Care Recipients**

Students pursuing bachelor’s degrees, associate’s degrees, or vocational certificates at public higher education institutions in Maryland qualify for the Foster Care Recipient Tuition Waiver – a full waiver of all tuition and school fees each year, for up to five years – if they:

- Complete and file their FAFSA of their year of enrollment; and
- Enroll in school on or before their 25th birthday; and
- Have a qualifying foster care status with their Local Department of Social Services (LDSS), which means:
  - Student is currently in an out-of-home placement with their Local Department of Social Services; or
  - Student was in out-of-home care with their LDSS and then adopted or placed into guardianship at age 13 or older; or
  - Student was in out-of-home care with their LDSS and then adopted or placed into guardianship along with an older sibling who was age 13 or older at the time of the adoption or guardianship placement; or
  - Student was in out-of-home care for at least one year at age 13 or older and then reunified with a parent.

To establish eligibility for the waiver, a student should contact the financial aid office of his or her higher education institution and explain that he or she should be on the Department of Human Resources’ list of students qualifying for the Foster Care Recipient Tuition Waiver. Once the student has established his or her eligibility, he or she will qualify for the waiver in that school year and all subsequent years (up to five years, or until he or she graduates) without needing to re-verify his or her status. <sup>1</sup> The shelter must be funded through HUD or the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act (RHYA); most publicly funded shelters fall within this category.

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### **Community College Tuition Waiver for Students with Disabilities Receiving SSI or SSDI**

A student with disability receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits is eligible to apply for this waiver. The student must provide proof from the Social Security Administration (SSA) of receiving SSI or SSDI benefits. For more information visit [www.mhec.maryland.gov](http://www.mhec.maryland.gov)

### **Financial Aid Resources for Homeless Youth and Foster Youth**

In addition to the various types of college financial aid available to all students, Maryland offers targeted assistance to unaccompanied homeless youth and foster youth. Below is a brief description of each relevant program. In collaboration with the Public Justice Center and Advocates for Children and Youth in Maryland, the MCAC ensures to provide current and relevant financial aid resources for homeless students and students in or transition to foster care. Below are several resources to support these student populations.

### **Maryland Unaccompanied Homeless Youth Tuition Waiver**

To qualify for the waiver, a youth must:

- Be homeless, including doubled up or couch surfing; staying in shelters; staying in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, motels/hotels because of a lack of alternatives, or on the street. Students who live on campus during the school year but are homeless during breaks are considered homeless for purposes of the waiver.
- Not be receiving financial or other support from a parent or legal guardian. Youth whose parents do not pay for college, but house the student over breaks, or pay for the students' living expenses are not eligible.
- Have lived in Maryland for at least one year.
- Have a high school diploma or GED.
- Complete and file the FAFSA (there is no deadline for filing, beyond general federal FAFSA deadlines)
- Be enrolled on or before he or she reaches the age of 25.

### **Coverage**

- The waiver covers the full cost of tuition and all enrollment fees at any public 4-year or 2-year college in Maryland.
- The waiver can be used for non-credit courses, including remedial courses and continuing education.
- Youth cannot be required to contribute other grants or scholarships to tuition or fees before the waiver is applied; the waiver must cover these costs in full.
- The waiver does not cover the cost of books or living expenses.
- Other grants or scholarships that the youth receives may be used towards books and living expenses.

### **Application Process**

To access the waiver, a youth must:

- File a FAFSA, answering the questions about unaccompanied homeless youth status<sup>1</sup> as follows:

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As written in the most recent FAFSA, the questions are: (56) At any time on or after July 1, 2015, were you determined to be an unaccompanied youth who was homeless or were self-supporting and at risk of being homeless, as determined by your high school or district homeless liaison? (57) At any time on or after July 1, 2015, were you determined to be an unaccompanied youth who was homeless or were self-supporting and at risk of being homeless, as determined by the director of an emergency shelter or transitional housing program funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; (58) At any time on or after July 1, 2015, were you determined to be an unaccompanied youth who was homeless or were self-supporting and at risk of being homeless, as determined by the director of a runaway or homeless youth basic center or transitional living program?"

- “Yes” - if the youth can obtain a letter confirming his/her status from a public school system McKinney-Vento liaison (for students applying to a higher education program upon high school graduation) or the director of a shelter funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) or Runaway and Homeless Youth Act Program (RHYA) verifying homeless status. The verification letter should be provided to the higher education institution’s financial aid office. Samples are available here: <http://www.naehcy.org/educational-resources/higher-ed>
- “No” - if the youth cannot obtain a determination letter. The youth should contact the institution’s financial aid office to ask staff to make a determination of unaccompanied homeless status. The institution cannot require the youth to present documentation as part of an initial determination.
- Unless the institution concludes that the youth is not an unaccompanied homeless youth (a determination which the youth can sometimes appeal internally), the youth will not have to provide any financial information for his/her parents or legal guardians
- Contact their higher education institution to explain that s/he is applying for the waiver
- Re-establish his/her eligibility each year.

### **Foster Youth Tuition Waiver**

To qualify for the waiver, a youth must:

- Have a qualifying foster care status: (1) currently in Maryland out-of-home care; or (2) was in Maryland out-of-home care and then adopted or placed into guardianship at age 13 or older; (3) was in Maryland out-of-home care and then adopted or placed into guardianship with an older sibling who was 13 or older at the time of the adoption or placement, or (4) was in Maryland foster care for at least a year on or after age 13 and reunified with a parent
- Complete and file the FAFSA by the general federal deadline.
- Be enrolled on or before he or she reaches the age of 25.

### **Coverage**

- The waiver covers the full cost of tuition and all school fees at any public 4-year or 2-year college, university, or vocational certificate program in Maryland.
- The waiver can be used for non-credit courses, including remedial courses and continuing education
- Youth cannot be required to contribute other grants or scholarships to tuition or school fees before the waiver is applied; the waiver must cover these costs in full
- The waiver does not cover the cost of books or living expenses.
- Other grants or scholarships that the youth receives may be used towards books and living expenses.

### **Application Process**

To access the waiver, a youth must:

- Complete the FAFSA by the federal deadline, answering “yes” to question #53 to confirm that s/he is a “ward of the court.” The youth will not have to provide financial information for parents or guardians.



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- Contact their higher education institution to explain that they are applying for the waiver, and confirm that their name should apply on the list of eligible foster care recipients prepared by the Department of Human Resources for that school year. If his/her name is not on the list, the youth
- may need to contact his or her Department of Social Service worker or child’s attorney to confirm his/her foster care status.
- **Note:** youth need not re-establish eligibility annually, except to complete the FAFSA.

### **Education Training Voucher (ETV)**

To qualify for the ETV, a youth must:

- Have a ETV- qualifying foster care status: (1) aged out of foster care in Maryland at age 18; or (2) was adopted from foster care in Maryland or placed into guardianship after age 16; or (3) currently in foster care in Maryland and aged 18, 19, or 20.
- Be a U.S. Citizen or qualified non-citizen
- Have personal assets (e.g. bank account, car, home) of less than \$10,000
- For first time applicants, be between ages 18 and 20; for renewal applicants, be under age 23
- To retain eligibility, must show academic progress towards a degree
- **Note:** Not all youth eligible for an ETV will receive one; vouchers are distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis as long as funds are available

### **Coverage**

- Up to \$5,000/year to cover tuition, and other school-related expenses for full-time students; up to \$2,500 for part-time students, based on unmet need.
- May be used to pursue a bachelor’s or associate’s degree, or a vocational certificate, at all accredited public and private colleges, universities, and vocational schools in the country.

### **Loan Repayment Assistance Program for Foster Care Recipients**

To qualify for the program, a youth must:

- Have been in foster care in any state for 3 or more years
- Have received federal, state, institution-based, or non-profit-based loans to support his or her pursuit of an undergraduate or graduate degree
- Have earned an undergraduate or graduate degree from a public or private higher education institution in Maryland
- Work for a state or local government agency in Maryland for 20 or more hours per week
- Agree to continue to work at the agency for at least 1 year after receiving a loan repayment award

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**Coverage**

- Pays out \$5,000 or 10% of the youth’s total higher education debt for the year, whichever is less, to assist the youth with repayment of loans
- **Note:** Not all youth eligible for the loan repayment program will receive assistance, which is offered on a first-come, first-serve basis as long as funds are available; however, the Governor must allot at least \$100,000 to the program per year.

**Application Process**

Maryland state and local government agencies must provide potentially eligible individuals with information about the program, and how to apply.

**National Association for the Education of Homeless Children and Youth (NAEHCY) Scholarship for Homeless Students**

- Any youth who was homeless – whether or not unaccompanied – at any time between kindergarten and 12<sup>th</sup> grade is eligible if his/her academic performance was average or above average.

**Coverage**

- The amount of the scholarship varies, and is generally only available for one year of education.

**Application Process**

#### Cash for College <sup>1</sup>

Maryland offers a vast number financial assistance programs to help pay for college. Each year, the State of Maryland awards millions in need-based grants, scholarships, and loan repayment programs. Every year, more than 65,000 students, receive money that ranges from \$200 per year to over \$19,100 per year. State financial aid awards for high school students include:

Educational Assistance Grant

The State's largest financial aid program helps low- and-middle income students, based upon financial need to attend a two-year or four-year Maryland Institution.

#### Who May Apply

- High school seniors who will be completing a college preparatory program may apply.
- Students interested in enrolling in a two-year technical program at a Maryland Community College.
- Student who graduated from high school no more than one year and has never attended a post-secondary education institution (with an appeal for extenuating circumstances).

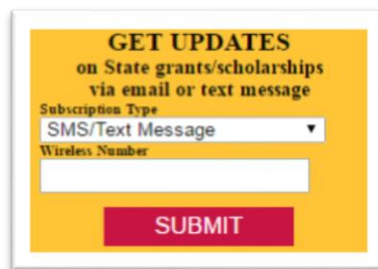

Maryland scholarship and grant programs are available to eligible students who plan to attend a public or private Maryland two-year or four-year College, university or private career school. State financial aid can be used by both part-time and full-time students. Financial aid resources are available to pay for college, how to apply for financial aid, a list of types of scholarships and grants, and information on MHEC’s comprehensive financial aid system (MDCAPS) that allows the processing of State scholarship applications.

## State Financial Text Messaging

## FAFSA Completion Initiative (FCI)

The FAFSA Completion Initiative is an initiative that allows high schools, school districts, and other designated entities the opportunity to have access to limited but valuable information to the FAFSA in order to assist students with the completion of the FAFSA. The goal of FCI provide high schools, school districts, and certain designated entities with FAFSA completion information to assist in guiding students and their families through the FAFSA process, increase the number of Maryland students who enter and complete a degree and/or credential, assist in meeting the State goal of a 55% completion rate by 2025 of Marylanders that have obtained a degree or credential, and maximize resources by connecting school counselors, students, and families through FAFSA. 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## Section 6

### Recruiting and Managing Volunteers

#### SECTION CHECKLIST

- Seek volunteers from among your school staff as well as admissions or academic advising staff from any local postsecondary institutions
- Seek volunteers from among student leadership
- Identify and contact other community organizations or individuals who may be appropriate to help
- Notify volunteers if school policy requires background checks
- Communicate with your volunteers early and often. Be sure your volunteers know well in advance their assignments and scheduled event(s)

#### Recruiting Volunteers

It is recommended that each MCAC site have one volunteer for every four to five computer stations during the designated time(s) for completing and submitting admissions applications.

Consider using seniors who have already completed college admissions applications to volunteer. They can help their peers who have not yet gone through the college admissions process. Seniors can also serve as mentors to freshmen, sophomores, or juniors in helping to prepare them for postsecondary education.

Additionally, student ambassadors from any grade level can help distribute materials, decorate the school, and promote MCAC activities. Identify students from each grade that would like to bring some ideas of their own. Ask students from each grade level to share and implement ideas and post and distribute materials.

As you recruit volunteers, be sure everyone involved with MCAC activities understands that the program is NOT a recruitment opportunity for individual colleges and postsecondary institutions. Volunteers from local colleges and universities are welcome but they do need to be aware that they may be helping students to apply to any of the thousands of postsecondary schools nationwide. Additionally, volunteers may wear a specific college's t-shirt, such as one from their alma mater, but they should refrain from promoting that school.

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## Volunteer Application

Check with your school system’s personnel office to find out if there is already an official volunteer form available to use. This form should ask potential volunteers to provide the following information:

- Name
- Email address
- Day-of telephone number
- MCAC Activities of interest
- How he or she heard about MCAC
- Organization or affiliation
- Physical address
- Areas of expertise
- Dates and hours the volunteer is available

Many school districts require background checks before a person may participate in a school day event. You may need to find and distribute your school’s policy to potential external volunteers. You may also need to supply a list of volunteers to the school’s administration.

## Volunteers are crucial to each site and may be assigned to one or more of the following roles:

- Checkout/exit table attendants
- Food/snack table helpers (optional)
- Application assistants
- Greeters
- Presenters, if offering a formal presentation, or moderators/facilitators
- Promotion assistants
- People to put up signage
- Runners for refreshments or additional supplies (e.g., pencils, pens, forms, etc.)
- Set up and cleanup crews

## Communicating with Volunteers

Each school’s MCAC site coordinator should contact volunteers regularly. Make sure each volunteer knows what his or her assignment is, when and where he or she should report, any specifics about parking or school procedures, what the appropriate or recommended attire is, and any contingency plans in case of inclement weather or an emergency.

Provide volunteers with information and links to help them prepare for your MCAC event. For instance, you may want to provide samples of the student preparation materials you use with the students. After your MCAC activities are over, be sure to thank your volunteers by sending them a certificate of appreciation or thank-you note.



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### **Volunteers Supporting the College Campaign**

To be a college campaign volunteer does not mean that the volunteer has to know everything about the Maryland College Application Campaign, however knowing more will be more meaningful to the volunteer's experience. A volunteer benefits by knowing that they helped someone open the door to a college education. College changes everything! Here are a few tasks that volunteers may be asked to contribute to the initiative at any given high school campaign:

- Good signage is essential. Therefore, asking volunteers to post directional signs in the school about the event and/or direction to designated areas for the campaign.
- Greet students as they arrive to complete their college applications in the computer lab, or other designated areas.
- Assisting students to log on to the computers and providing support with computer related issues/questions.
- Guide students through the application process, providing support with questions they may have.
- Help ensure that students register for their FSA ID after they submit their college applications.
- Guide student to complete the MCAC student survey.
- As requested, share personal college experience with student as an encouragement.
- Hand out "I Applied" stickers and other materials when students complete their college application process.
- Congratulate each student on completing the college application process, encouraging each student to complete additional requirements such as submitting their transcript, test scores, or any other required documents.
- Encourage students to share their college application experience with other classmates, family and friends.

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# Section 7

## Data and Reporting District Site Confirmation

By April 15 each year, district coordinators confirm all schools and site coordinators participating in the MCAC. If there are any questions regarding your MCAC events/program, the questions should be directed to your district coordinator prior to contacting the MSDE. All district coordinators receive a final copy of all data provided.

## MCAC Online Student Survey and Naviance

In 2015, the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) developed the MCAC online student survey. The online MCAC Student Survey replaced the tedious manual process of each site coordinator tallying the number of students that submitted one or multiple college and/or career applications, and other essential information required for reporting and technical assistance purposes. For the MCAC, the data collection process is a vital collaborative effort to inform improvements. The MCAC data is collected via the online student survey that is provided subsequent to each student who completes a college application. The online student survey is also located on the MCAC website which may be accessed through the MSDE webpage at [www.mdarylandpublicschools.org/mdcac](http://www.mdarylandpublicschools.org/mdcac). The link to access the online student survey will be forwarded to each site coordinator via email.

Schools that are using **Naviance** or other career technology solution sites, must submit responses to the State Coordinator to the following questions:

- What is the **total number of students** who participated in the MCAC?
- What was the **total number** of applications (all postsecondary) submitted?

The **MCAC Online Student Survey** serves as the main data tracking mechanism for the MCAC Application Week in October. It is best practice to have the student complete the online student survey with supervision, after he or she completes a college or career application. However, if needed, you may forward the online student survey link to student in a text blast to complete the survey. **It is imperative that each student complete the survey to ensure your school is credited with all of the student data from your school.**

**Survey Monkey™** will collect the data from each individual student enabling MSDE to run reports by school on all necessary data points. Schools will receive their data reports from the MSDE by December 30th.

**NOTE:** It may be helpful to keep a roster of your participating high school seniors and where they are in the process. This will help you as you plan future activities. All data entered in the online MCAC student survey will not be available right away to individual schools.

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As a reminder, the **MCAC online student survey** may also be linked to Naviance, or other college and readiness software application that provides students with college planning and career assessment tools. Consult your technology department for assistance with the process.

### **Final Programmatic Report**

The programmatic report requests information such as program logistics, program participants/volunteers, activities, marketing, etc. This report is crucial in the development of the MCAC final report and provides insight to improve the program for the upcoming year. The programmatic report questionnaire is disseminated to all site coordinators in early April and is due to the MSDE in May.

### **FAFSA Completion Event Form- Registration**

Submitting applications is only part of the college application process. Understanding how to pay for college with grants, loans, and scholarships and how to apply for money that is available from the State and Federal government and other institutions is essential. ***It is imperative that each school site participating in the MCAC must host or participate in a FAFSA Completion Event. School sites may registration online at [www.collegegoalmaryland.org](http://www.collegegoalmaryland.org).*** By registering online for your FAFSA Completion event, you will be able to track information on all FAFSA completion events including the number of parents, students, and volunteers participating in each event.

**College Applications – Frequently Asked Questions**

**1. Are all college applications the same?**

The short answer, no. Most colleges have applications unique to their institution, but you will find most questions to be similar. Not every application will require an essay, letters of recommendation, college entrance exam scores, and/or have an application fee. For questions typically asked on college applications, look at the College Application Worksheet in the American Council on Education’s Student Application Resource Guide (<http://www.acenet.edu/news-room/Pages/ACAC-Resources.aspx>).

**2. When should I start the college application process?**

We recommend you know which colleges you want to apply to by September 1 of your senior year. Traditionally, most high school seniors will complete their college applications in September and October in order to meet application deadlines. Check out this college application checklist from GetSchooled: <https://getschooled.com/dashboard/article/4217-how-to-apply-to-college-badge-building-your-college-application-plan>

**3. How do I pick the schools I should apply to?**

The sooner you start this research process, the more confident you’ll feel in your decision. We recommend researching colleges of interest during your junior year and over the summer. **4. How many schools should I apply to?**

We recommend applying to one or two best fit schools (where you are likely to get in but are not guaranteed acceptance), one or two reach schools (where you may be accepted), and at least one safety school (where you’re guaranteed to be accepted). Including at least one safety school should guarantee you receive at least one acceptance letter. If you are worried about application fees, talk to your school counselor to see if you qualify for an application fee waiver. <https://getschooled.com/dashboard/article/4218-how-to-apply-to-college-badge-get-your-college-application-fee-waiver>

## 5. Who can provide the most help with your college applications?

Counselors, parents, siblings, coaches, teachers, and Get Schooled. Think of every adult in your life that has attended college and ask for help! You can also use resources like Get Schooled to help you! Text **COLLEGE to 335577** to text with college counselors and get answers you need quickly!

## 6. How much time should I give myself to complete my college applications?

Before you start your college application, make sure you sit down and know all the application requirements. If you have your essay(s) and letter of recommendation(s) ready, a college application could be completed within one hour. If you still need to write your essay(s) and receive letters or recommendation, you'll need to set aside more time. If an essay is required, you should plan for several drafts to get it into a final state. Give yourself time to have it reviewed by trusted adults, or send it to Get Schooled using the [College Essay Feedback Tool](#). Likewise, if letters of recommendation are required, think about adults who know you best in various aspects of life. And be sure to give them enough time to write a letter on your behalf! The application will not be complete until the letters of recommendation are submitted.

## 7. What do I do if my test scores are lower than the school average?

Don't let this stop you from applying. Schools consider a variety of factors when admitting students. You can also consider taking the ACT or SAT again. Check ACT.org and SAT.org for upcoming test dates.

## 8. Should I tell the school I'm applying on their social media pages?

Colleges and universities love interacting with current and potential students on social media. Like the college(s) you're interested in on Facebook! They take notice and it's an easy way to indicate you are interested. Make sure you clean up your social media as well. Mentioning the college on social media may get a shout-out or retweet.

**Remember:** Your college applications are not complete until you have submitted ALL required documents and application fees or waivers (if required). That includes your official high school transcript, official test scores (ACT, SAT, TASC/GED etc.), and letters of recommendation. Make sure to follow up with your counselor, the testing company and those you've asked for recommendations.

**Check your application status:** You are responsible for checking the status of your application at the college admissions offices. Allow 8 to 10 weeks for processing after sending your application and supporting documents.

**Make sure** you send the all the information necessary to complete your application; it will not be considered unless all documentation is supplied.

### ***I Applied. What's Next?***

**Congratulations!** You are now on the path to college. This is what you can expect next.

#### **Follow-up**

Make sure you have taken care of all supporting documents required for your college applications:

- Submitted your application fee (or a fee waiver or deferral form)
- Asked your school counselor to send your official transcript to the college
- Submitted your additional essays as required
- Asked your references or school counselor to send letters of recommendation
- Requested official transcripts you might have from any other college courses you may have taken outside of high school
- Requested official test scores required -- SAT, ACT, AP, IB or TOEFL

#### **Apply for Financial Aid**

You'll need to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, the FAFSA, which is your key to aid to help pay for college. **The deadline to submit the FAFSA in Maryland is March 1<sup>st</sup>.** This should be done as soon as possible after October 1<sup>st</sup> when it is available

online at [fafsa.gov](http://fafsa.gov). You can find FAFSA help available beginning in October at [StartHereGetThere.org](http://StartHereGetThere.org), when you can also learn about types of federal and Maryland State financial aid that may be available to you.

Look for FAFSA completion workshops and College Goal Maryland events that can provide one-on-one assistance for completing your FAFSA. They'll be scheduled in many locations across Maryland with dates and times posted on [StartHereGetThere.org](http://StartHereGetThere.org).

#### **When You Will Hear from the Colleges**

You should receive acceptance letters and financial aid award letters by April.

#### **Know your deadlines**

Make sure you know **all** your college deadlines so you don't miss any important decisions that may impact you later. There are deadlines for:

- Financial Aid (varies by college)
- Acceptance (usually by May 1<sup>st</sup>)
- Residence choices (varies by college)

#### **While you are waiting**

Spring seems far away, but take some time to thank those people who have helped you on your path to college...counselors, your recommenders, mentors, coaches or anyone else who has been an inspiration for you to go to college. **Be proud! You are pursuing your education after high school!**

## After Your College Application Campaign Program

Be sure to report your success! All participating students must complete a brief MCAC Student Survey. The survey will assist in reporting the number of students who participated and the total number of applications submitted. Site coordinators will receive the results for their campaign. The link to the survey may also be found on the MCAC website at [www.marylandpublicschools.org/mdcac](http://www.marylandpublicschools.org/mdcac).

After your College Application Campaign Week event, your school team should meet to debrief on the success and challenges of the current year initiative. The debrief session should occur as close to the conclusion of your school's College Application Campaign Week event as possible.

By quickly assessing what worked and what areas need improvement, your school team can get a jump-start on planning for the following year's program and create an action plan to follow-up with participating students who need to complete the college application and financial aid application processes.

You will be asked to complete a MCAC Site Programmatic Survey to communicate to the State Coordinator about your successes and challenges, which you can also use to update your school team and community at large. The school team should plan to follow-up with participating students to ensure they complete the application process (by submitting transcripts, test scores, etc.) and that they submit a completed FAFSA.

After the event, it's important to thank the volunteers who assisted you in the process; a volunteer thank you letter template you may wish to use is included in this guidebook.

As we all know, the journey to successfully enrolling in post-secondary education does not end with the submission of a college application. There are several more steps that each participating student will need to complete over the next few months such as submitting recommendation letters and completing and submitting a FAFSA. Schools participating in the FAFSA Completion Initiative will have access to the list of students who applied for the FAFSA. The list will provide details regarding the completion and submission status of each student's FAFSA application. As such, it is important that your team implements a plan to follow-up with participating students.

## What To Do After Completing the FAFSA

There is more to just completing the FAFSA. Refer to the tips below to ensure you are satisfying all steps in the financial aid process.

- Based on your FAFSA data, the government creates a Student Aid Report (SAR) and sends it to you, via e-mail and to all the colleges you listed on your FAFSA. Review your SAR for accuracy. If necessary, correct inaccurate items online at [www.fafsa.gov](http://www.fafsa.gov).
- If you did not use the IRS Data Retrieval Tool when completing your FAFSA online, please go back in and select that option to ensure that data presented is accurate.
- Promptly respond to any school that requests additional information or documents, such as IRS Transcripts or verification worksheets.
- If you have extenuating circumstances, such as a change in income or large medical expenses, provide detailed information about those circumstances to the Office of Financial Aid.
- You will receive an “Award Notification” from each college you have been accepted to. Compare all awards. Understand what you are being offered. Most financial aid funds have conditions for receipt and renewal, such as earning a certain grade point average (GPA) or being enrolled full-time. Contact the college’s Office of Financial Aid if you have any questions about your award.
- Finalize your financial plan. Accept the offer of your choosing.
- Complete the promissory note for any loan(s) you are offered and wish to accept. Make sure you read and understand all of your loan rights and responsibilities. Check with the college’s Office of Financial Aid regarding any loan counseling you must complete before you may receive the loan proceeds.
- If you have been awarded student employment, find out the details of possible job opportunities, how to apply for jobs, and what the wages are.
- Promptly notify your college’s Office of Financial Aid of any outside or private scholarship, grant, or other type of student aid you expect to receive.
- Make copies and maintain files of all application materials for future reference.
- Complete the FAFSA annually on October 1<sup>st</sup> to continue receiving financial aid!
- Macrh 1<sup>st</sup> is Maryland’s deadline to submit the FAFSA.

Register for your FSA ID – you will need this to complete your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form between October 1<sup>st</sup> and March 1<sup>st</sup>. After you submit your college application(s) and register for your FSA ID, be sure to submit the **MCAC student survey**. Your feedback is extremely important to us.

If available, complete the student sign-out sheet before you leave the computer lab. You will need to list the colleges for which you applied, whether you completed the FSA ID process and if you registered for the College Goal Maryland FAFSA Completion Events.

Follow-up! Make sure you submit any additional information the colleges you applied to require. This could include recommendation letters, test scores, and high school transcripts.

# TYPES OF POSTSECONDARY OPTIONS

**Postsecondary is any education option after high school.** Options may include two-year college, four-year college or university, Independent Private Career Schools, Military, For Profit College, and apprenticeships (on-the-job training).

**Community colleges** are public institutions that offer programs that last two-years. Community colleges are open to everyone with a high school diploma or GED and can be a stepping stone to a four-year degree. Tuition rates are usually the lowest among all types of colleges. In Maryland, there are 24 community colleges. These colleges usually do not offer the option to live on campus.

**Degrees:** Associate and Certificate.

**Private institutions**, sometimes called career or technical college offer undergraduate and/or graduate programs of various lengths. Many have specialized programs such as culinary or cosmetology schools, while other schools may have programs completely online (also known as distance learning). These schools are for-profit businesses, meaning they are expected to make money for their owners or shareholders. Therefore, tuition rates are usually higher than other types of colleges.

**Degrees:** may offer Certificate, License, Associate, Bachelor's, Master's, Doctoral or Professional.

**Public colleges or universities** offer four-year programs. In Maryland, the basic entrance requirements include a high school diploma or GED (*contact the school directly for specific admission requirements*). Public universities offer in-state tuition, which means tuition rates are lower for students who are residents of the state where the college is located.

**Degrees:** Bachelor's, may offer Post-baccalaureate Certificate, Master's, Doctoral or Professional

Joining the **Military** is a big decision. Think carefully and talk with family and/or a trusted adult as well as representatives from the Military as you consider your options.

**Military Academies:** Extremely elite and selective, students receive full four-year scholarships. Service after graduation is required.

**ROTC:** Train to be an officer while earning a Bachelor's degree with Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC). Scholarships are available.

**Enlistment:** Requires a high school diploma or GED. Upon completion of service, veterans are eligible for money for college.

**Private colleges or universities** offers four-year programs. Entrance requirements vary, with some colleges admitting the majority of applicants and others only a small percentage of highly qualified students (*contact the school directly for specific requirements*).

Tuition rates are usually higher than public institutions, but they may be able to offer more generous financial aid packages.

**Degrees:** Bachelor's, may offer Post-baccalaureate Certificate, Master's, Doctoral or Professional.

**Apprenticeships:** Paid on-the-job training and classroom learning for a specific trade. In Maryland, most apprenticeships are connected to the construction trade and require a high school diploma or GED

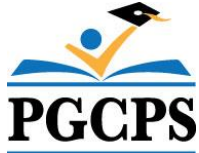

### **OK, so you've applied to college and that's great, but what happens now?**

Applying is one of the first steps on your path to attending college. Keep in mind that it may take a couple of months for the college or university to get back to you. Here's a step- by-step guide for what to do in the meantime:

Once you've submitted your application, make sure that you've turned in everything you need in order for the college to consider you as a potential student. Have you:

- Submitted your application fee (if the college charges a fee)?
- Submitted any required transcripts to the college?
- Submitted your letters of recommendation (if required by the college)?
- Submitted your essay (if required by the college)?

Even after you're accepted to a college, there's still a lot of work to do to make your final decision and get ready. You'll want to consider what financial aid is available to you at the colleges you're considering, and you'll want to decide if you want to live on campus or commute. Of course, once you decide on a college, you'll need to register as a new student and enroll in classes. Here are a few of the items you'll need to consider later this year.

**Financial Aid:** Sometime after October 1<sup>st</sup>, you'll need to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). If possible, you should complete the FAFSA before **March 1<sup>st</sup>**, because that's the deadline for many State-level scholarship programs.

**You can get in-person, confidential assistance completing the FAFSA by attending a College Goal Sunday (CGS) workshop.** To learn more, visit <http://collegegoalsundaymd.org/>.

Explore the "cash for college" resources available on [http://www.nasfaa.org/students/About\\_Financial\\_Aid.aspx](http://www.nasfaa.org/students/About_Financial_Aid.aspx) to learn about all of the state and federal financial aid opportunities available to you. Visit college and university websites to see what sort of financial aid and scholarship programs are offered at the school you plan to attend. Complete and submit applications for as many scholarships, grants, and other financial aid awards as you can find!

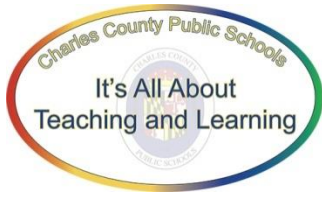

**Charles County Public Schools Pilots State Program to Help Seniors Learn College Application Process**

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is piloting the Maryland College Application Campaign Week next month to assist high-school seniors in applying to college, with the goal of each student submitting at least one application to the college, university or technical school of their choice. During the week of Oct. 19-23, seniors at several Charles County high schools will participate in the campaign by working with school staff and volunteers during the school day to submit at least one complete application.

In 2014, the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) piloted the campaign in 21 high schools with more than 1,900 students participating statewide. In 2018, the campaign more than tripled to 166 schools in 19 school systems. While the campaign targets all high school seniors, activities focus on educating first generation, low-income students, unaccompanied homeless youth, foster care youth, students with disabilities, students in the juvenile education system, home school students in how to successfully research and complete the college application process. According to Alicia Jones, the supervising school counselor for CCPS, some students do not complete college applications because they do not know how to start or even complete the process. "Our goal for this campaign is for every graduating senior to complete at least one college application. We will teach them how to step-by-step and walk them through the process," she said.

In order to prepare for the campaign, high school English teachers have been working with their students to complete essential parts of most college applications, including a written essay, resume and letters of recommendation. This year's senior class of students worked on a college fit/application worksheet as juniors last school year as part of a required English III graded assignment. As part of the assignment, students were required to research four possible colleges, universities or trades schools they were interested in learning more about. Part of the worksheet also required students to list their extra-curricular activities and test scores in preparation for including this information on an application.

Most colleges and universities charge prospective students a fee to submit an application, but many community colleges such as the College of Southern Maryland (CSM) offer free applications. As part of the campaign, CSM admissions staff will attend each participating school Oct. 23-27 to work with students on completing a free CSM application. Staff members from CSM visit high schools annually to talk to students about local offerings and most students complete a CSM placement test as juniors. Seniors who apply to CSM during Maryland College Application Week will already have test scores on file as part of their application.

Schools participating in the CCPS pilot program are Henry E. Lackey, La Plata, Maurice J. McDonough, Thomas Stone and Westlake high schools. College and career advisors at these schools are coordinating activities to highlight the upcoming campaign and are helping to connect students with resources to learn more about applying to college and planning for their future after graduation. These activities also include a focus on the FAFSA, or the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and helping students collect the data needed to complete a FAFSA. Results from a student's FAFSA help colleges and universities determine amounts of financial assistance or scholarship opportunities.

Some students may qualify for application waivers and/or SAT/ACT exam waivers through CSM's Educational Talent Search (ETS) program. This program is federally funded by the U.S. Department of Education and supports Charles County community members ages 11-27 in their search to access higher education. Eligibility is based on criteria such as family income, age, and if the participant is a first-generation college student, secondary school dropout or veteran. The ETS program also provides academic, personal and peer counseling, assistance with college orientation and tours, tutoring resources, SAT/ACT preparation courses and career orientation activities. Students interested in finding out if they are eligible for support through the ETS program can call 301-934-2251 to request an eligibility

application.

A copy of the college fit/application worksheet, as well as a list of application fees for Maryland schools, is posted on the CCPS website at <http://www.ccboe.com/Departments/counseling/docs/MarylandCollegeApplicationCampaignWeek1516.pdf>. High schools will also be hosting financial aid workshops later this school year to walk students and parents through the process of researching aid and completing scholarship applications and the FAFSA.
