Teaching and Learning Resources for 9/11

The Edward M. Kennedy Serve America Act of 2009 adopted by the U. S. Congress in 2009 federally recognizes September 11 as a day of service and remembrance. The State Frameworks in Social Studies in Grade 5, High School United States History, and Modern World History provided by the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) offer opportunities for students to inquire about the historic events associated with September 11, 2001. The sequence of those frameworks places the related objectives in the concluding units of those frameworks, typically in January or May given the structure of the local school system's schedule.
